Number:

We will be learning all about the number stories from 11 to 20 in school. Children should be encouraged to practice these at home, orally and using physical materials to create a multisensory learning approach.

We will also be counting on and back in 2s, 5s and 10s to 50, then 100. Please practice this at home also!

We are using the words 'before, between and after' to discuss the position of numbers on the numberline. You can help consolidate this learning by using the same language at home to discuss the position of people in a queue, the colours of cars when you're stuck in traffic or you could even use a tape measure as your very own numberline!

Shape, Space and Measure:

We will be learning all about 2D and 3D shapes this term. Children should be encouraged to look for shapes in everyday objects e.g. rectangular windows, circular clocks, ice cream cones, cans of food as cylinders etc...This is also a great opportunity to discuss how many sides/corners/faces household objects have.

The World Around Us

Our topic for the term is Travel and Transport. We will be focussing on Types of transport and ways to travel and then we will be learning about the impact of travel on the environment and how we can make it Eco-Friendly.

Fónaic na Gaeilge – Phonics

Children will be practising letters and sounds every day using the Cód na Gaeilge Scheme for teaching phonics in Irish. To help, you could also practise saying and singing the alphabet at home. Ask your children for help with the sounds!

Punctuation:

Rang 3 will be busy learning all about using full stops and capital letters in their writing. We will also be learning about question marks. Parents should also encourage them to notice punctuation in reading books and newspapers/magazines at home. *E.g. "Can you see any full stops or question marks on this page?"*



Reading:

Reading aloud is one of the best ways to encourage children to thrive in literacy lessons. Children should read their reading book every night, taking the chance to also discuss pictures and stories covered by the book.
